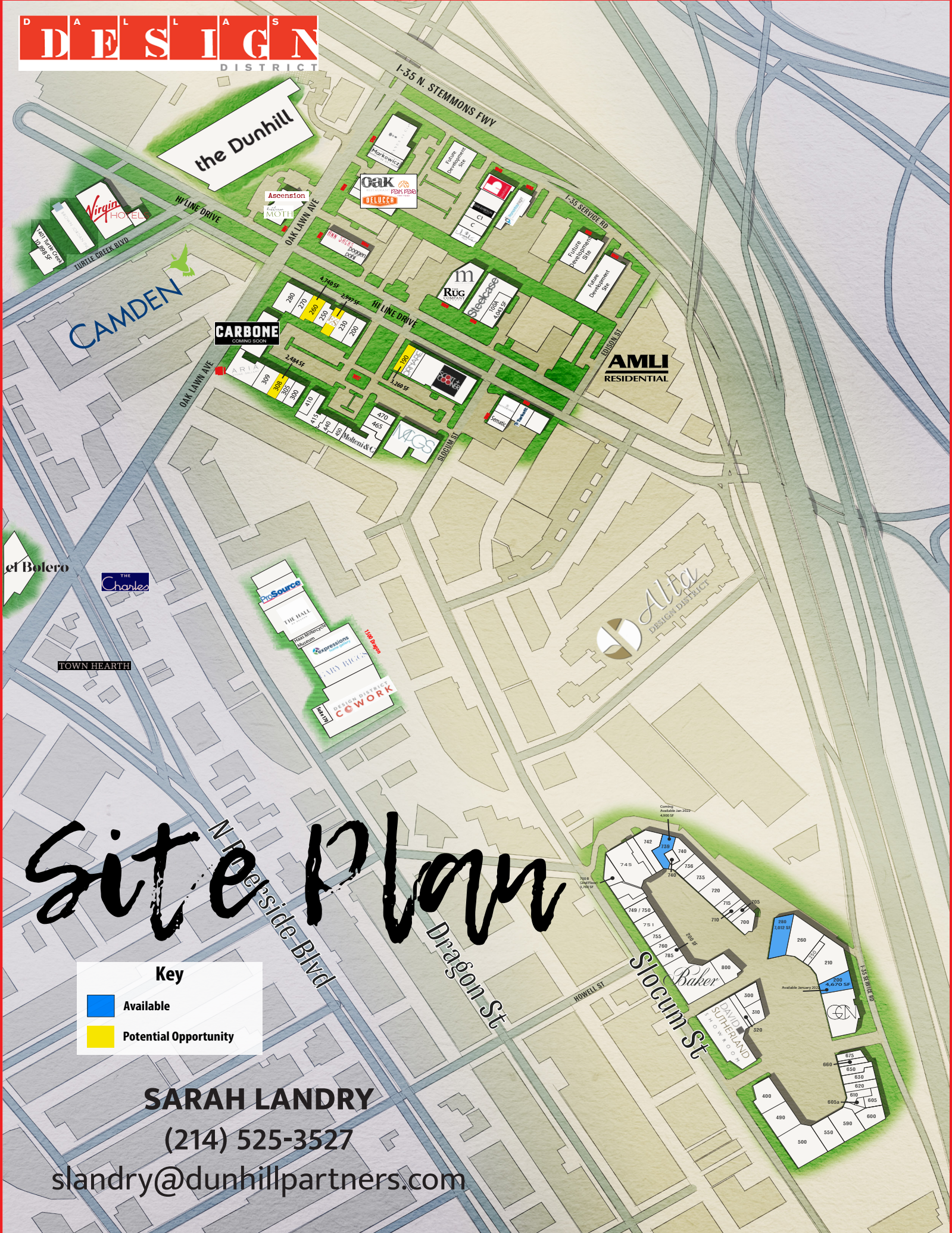

This high-profile, area encompasses approximately 40 acres in downtown Dallas where old and new are merging together to create a **vibrant** future.

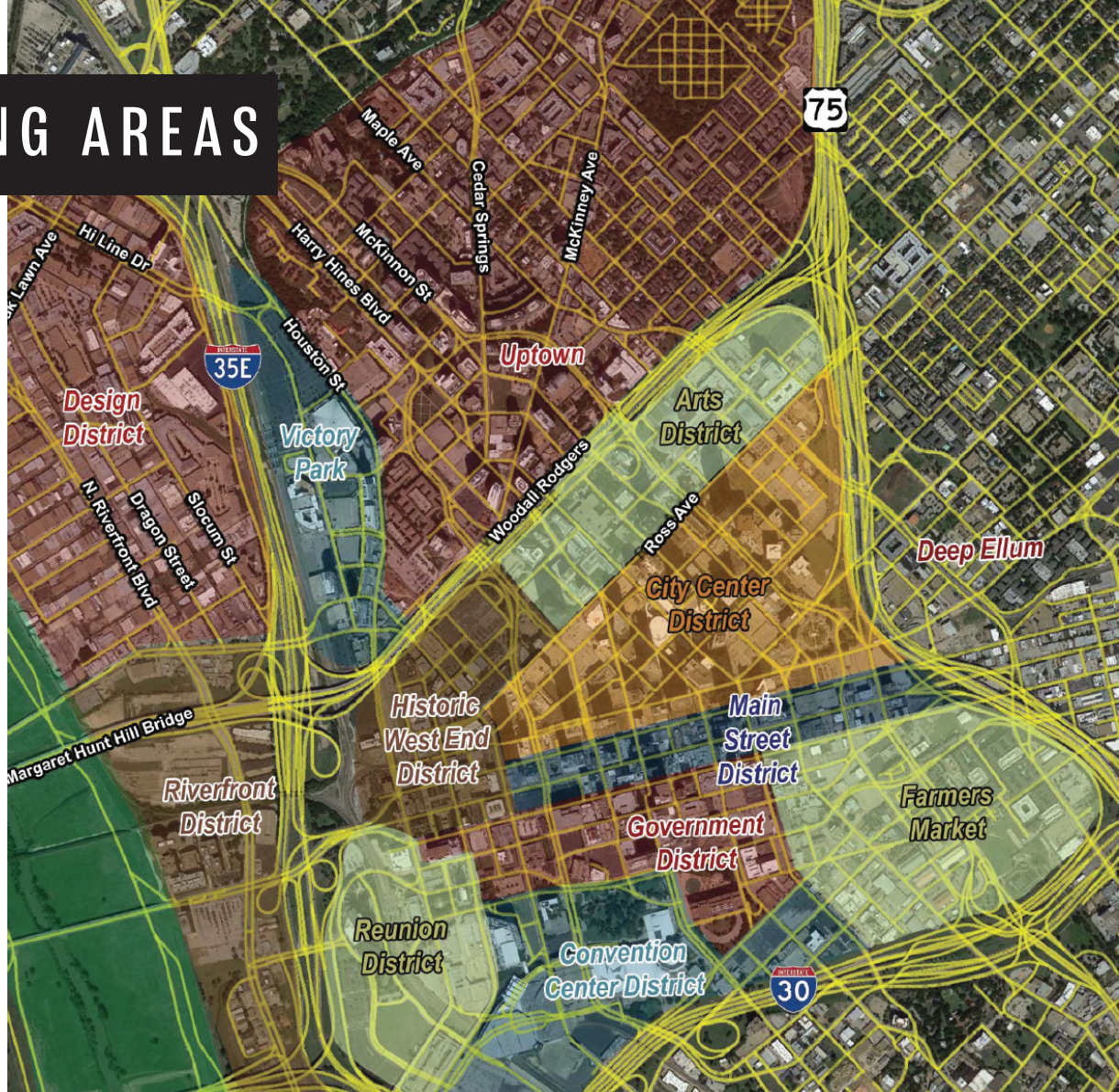

SURROUNDING AREAS

The District is surrounded by the most dense and affluent employment centers in Texas. This exceptional location lies in proximity to Uptown and Downtown Dallas, Victory Park, West End, Trinity Groves, and the Medical District with a 30-minute drive to DFW International airport and 6-minute drive to the expanding Dallas Love Field airport.

EDUCATION

Education is also a major contributing factor for the Dallas population. Currently, there are 26 colleges and universities and five community college districts with 17 campuses that enroll approximately 200,000 students. In early 2013, the George Bush Presidential Library opened which draws over 250,000 visitors annually and is located across the street from SMU and 15 minutes from the Dallas Design District.

THE DALLAS MEDICAL DISTRICT

The Dallas Medical District employs over 29,000 Health industry jobs with over \$2 billion in improvements with a \$1.27 billion replacement campus for the "New Parkland hospital located 5 minutes down I-35. The New improvements include 862 adult bed full-service care that spans 1.7 million square feet employing over 10,000 employees.

CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT

The Central Business District (CBD) includes the Arts District, Ross Avenue Corridor, Main Street District, West End, Convention, and Government Districts which employs over 140,000 high profile business and affluent professionals.

DALLAS MARKET CENTER

The Dallas Market Center, is just minutes off of Stemmons Freeway and one exit from Oak Lawn. The Market Center is a 5 million square foot campus for wholesale trade and showrooms hosting trade events and markets that attracts more than 50,000 attendees from 50 states and 78 countries with transactions total an estimated \$8 billion.

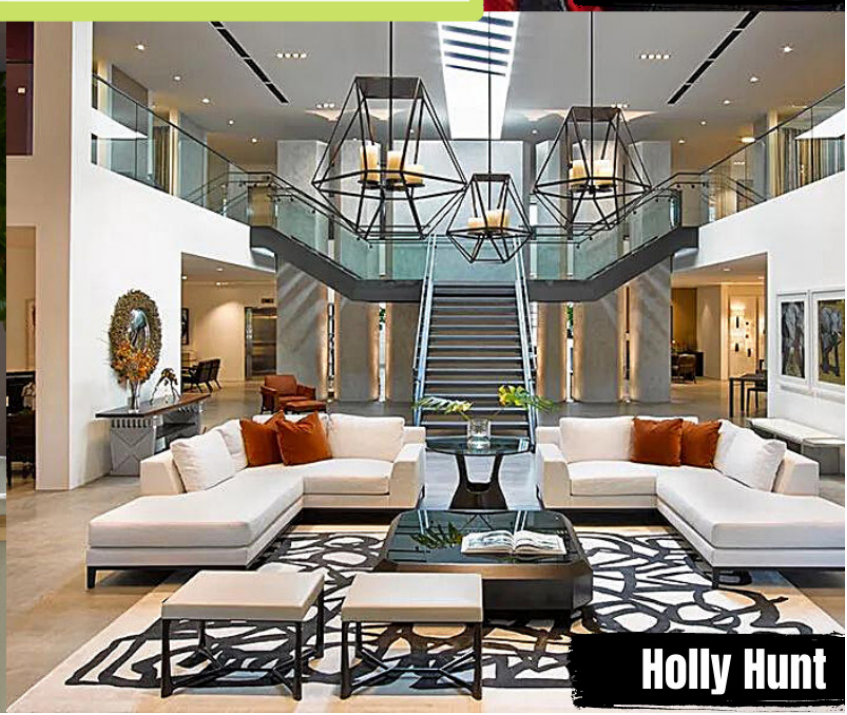

The eight-acre **Dallas Decorative Center** was the first development in the Dallas Design District. Build-in 1957 by Trammell Crow, the Decorative Center's first 13 tenants established the very first center for wholesale design in the country. Today, the complex, which sits at the corner of Oak Lawn Ave. and Hi Line Drive, is on the culling edge of the design industry's advances. In an age of declining showroom sales, the businesses in Dallas don't seem to be touched, instead industry-leading innovations by a creative landlord and many formerly trade-only businesses are opening to the public and bridging the gap between trade and retail marketing.

Since opening in 1982, the 14.2 acres, **Dallas Design Center** has cultivated a reputation as the premier destination for designers, architects, and other professionals seeking the very finest in furnishings, textiles, and more. There are numerous showrooms, encompassing approximately 368,000 square feet of retail space, with luxury offerings including custom traditional and contemporary furniture, specialty lighting, carpet and rugs, ironworks, bath, bedding, artwork, and accessories. The center is nationally noted for its collection of luxury fabric and textile purveyors.



In 2012, the "District" welcomed its first **brewery**, Peticolas, followed soon after by Community Beer Company & Reunion Brewing Company. Bowlounge has 12 regulation length bowling lanes, and cool vintage scoring. Patrons enjoy 75-foot bar with 40 taps and food by Twisted Root.

The restaurants and bars found in the Dallas Design District have each established a dedicated following, and while they could stand alone, are an integral part of the fabric of the Dallas Design District.

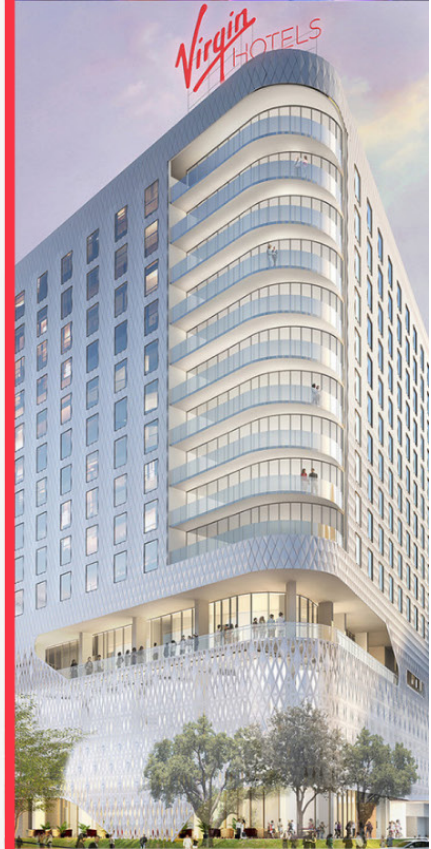
